


Long Walk to Water, A

SUGGESTED CLASSROOM USAGE

The novel is appropriate as a read aloud, literature circle selection, and/or class novel study. It would allow for dramatic role-play; it links to Social Studies and Social Responsibility.

SOCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Age:

Young children must work hard to help support their family. The war-torn country creates dire conditions for Salva.

Gender Roles, Identity & Sexual Orientation:

Men are implied to be more important as they have opportunities (school) not provided to females; girls have specific household chores and boys help provide and care for livestock.

Belief System:

Children are treated poorly. Salva is left behind because he is a possible burden to the group.

Socio Economic:

The novel depicts extreme poverty. People struggle to survive with little to nothing to eat or use as shelter.

Violence:

Thenovels takes place during the Sudanese civil war in 1985 so there are guns, etc.

Safety:

Young children walk through the desert on their own and refugees flee through different countries on foot through day and night.

Social Considerations Comments:

The grade 6 Social Studies curriculum is well supported by this novel with reference to child rights. Social responsibility curricula is supported with reference to 'one person can make a difference'. Numerous virtues are addressed, as well, for schools that use the virtue program. There is also a current events and global awareness focus.

School is not an option for her. The boy, Salva, becomes a 'lost boy' refugee when forced to walk away from his school and his war-torn village in 1985 during the Sudanese Civil War. Each learns to overcome adversity through perseverance and hope.
