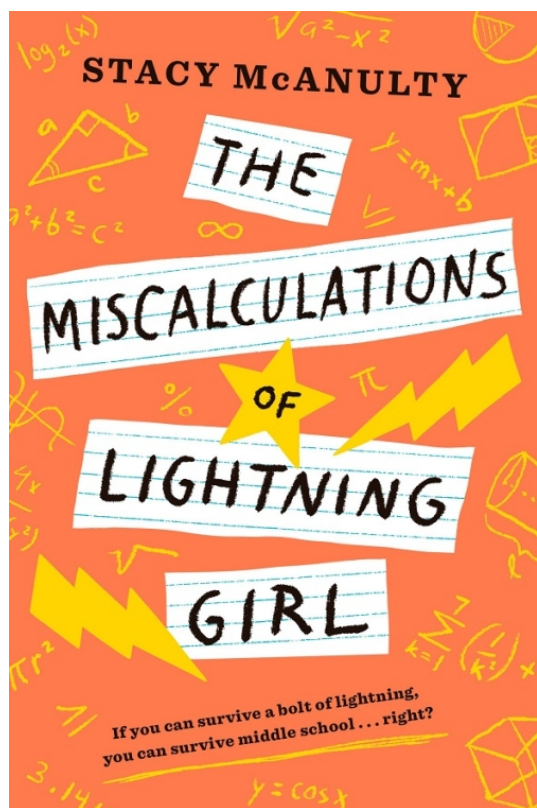


# Miscalculations of Lightning Girl, The

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When Lucy was struck by lightning at age eight it changed her life: she acquired savant syndrome and math superpowers. Homeschooled her entire life, she is shocked when at age twelve her grandma insists she attend school. Lucy struggles to fit in as her math skills and compulsive behaviours are very noticeable, but she befriends others who have trouble fitting in and together they work to save unwanted animals in a local shelter. Suitable for a class read-aloud or literature circle, this engaging novel explores accepting and embracing differences, strengths and abilities, being true to oneself, friendships, families, fitting in at a new school, and bullying.

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## **SUGGESTED CLASSROOM USAGE**

This resource could be used as a classroom read-aloud and in literature circles. This book can allow students a chance to connect with and understand how people have different abilities and strengths. This book also explores different types of families as well as the complexities of friendships such as making friends, virtual and in-person friendships, and bullying.

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## **SOCIAL CONSIDERATIONS**

**Gender Roles, Identity & Sexual Orientation:**

Gender does not appear to be an important idea to Lucy, but she does point out to her uncle that it would be sexist to assume that boys are better at math than girls. In another instance, her nana tells her to smile as a way to help her make friends because she is such a beautiful girl when she smiles.

**Ability:**

This book portrays a girl who has acquired savant syndrome after being struck by lightning which has given her beyond-typical math skills. She also demonstrates some routines around hand washing, using Clorox wipes to sanitize everything, sitting and standing three times before being able to sit, and reciting the decimal points in Pi to allow her to keep her mind clear.

**Socio Economic:**

Lucy, whose mother passed away from cancer and whose father never met her, lives with her grandmother in a modest apartment in North Carolina which is contrasted at times with the lavish home of her friend Windy.

**Violence:**

At one point Windy references a knife being brought to school by a student at a nearby school and how her mom refers to the school now as a "gang school".

**Ethical:**

Lucy and her friends are working on a project to save animals from a shelter and some of the animals are considered unadoptable and could be turned over to animal control. Consent is also an issue with Lucy's friend Levi taking pictures of others without their permission. This is something he is repeatedly warned about. As well, when Windy hugs Lucy she says, "I don't move. I don't breathe. I don't approve". At the birthday party, one of the characters is jumping around attempting to pull down everyone's pants.

**Humour:**

Lucy's routines and phobia of germs are used in a light-hearted way and her friends embrace her quirky ways.

**Safety:**

Prior to enrolling in a public school, Lucy's only friends were her virtual friends from an online math group. Lucy does not know anything about these friends other than their shared love of math. It is evident that these friends are adults which is shown when one asks her what she is teaching when she mentions she has class and another time she wonders if she could be chatting with her teacher. This could create a safety concern as neither Lucy nor her guardians

know who she is really communicating with. At the pool, Madison's mother tells her to stand up straight and signals for her to suck in her stomach, and also reminds her to watch her diet. This could lead to body insecurity issues.

**Do the social considerations support, rather than detract from, student learning?**

### **Social Considerations Comments:**

This novel takes a light-hearted look at the life of a student who is different and struggling to fit in. It shows us how differences can be embraced and accepted by others and one does not need to change who they are to be accepted by others. The social considerations could also lead to class discussions around appropriate behaviour, friendships, consent, and differences in ability, strengths, and challenges.

### **Plot description:**

This is a story of 12-year-old Lucy Callahan who gets struck by lightning and acquires some special math superpowers. After initially being homeschooled, her grandmother forces her to go to middle school where she tries to fit in despite sticking out because of her compulsive behaviours and genius math skills. She befriends some other students who have trouble fitting in and they all come together for a project to save the unwanted animals in a shelter.

### **Related Comments:**

The readers sympathize with Lucy's difficulties to fit in and are given insight into her struggles and acceptance of her germ phobia and compulsive behaviours. Readers watch how her friends accept her for who she is as she shows them her true self.
