



Guinea Dog

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Fifth-grader Rufus desperately wants a dog but his father is clear that they are not going to get one. When Rufus's mother brings home a guinea pig as a concession to both of them, it pleases neither Rufus nor his father, but the guinea pig worms her way into the hearts of father and son, and even Rufus friends admire his unusual pet that acts like a dog. This grade 3-6 novel could be used for read-aloud, guided novel study, independent reading, Book Club or Literature Circle. Useful to promote discussions/ writing activities about friendship, family relationships, and pet ownership. The first in a series about Rufus and Fido.

CURRICULUM FIT

Does the resource support BC curriculum?

Guinea Dog is a novel that supports the BC English Language Arts curriculum by using humour and the universally-appealing topic of pets to motivate reading for pleasure. It also helps readers understand ourselves and make connections to others and to the world. Readers can use personal experiences and prior knowledge to deepen their understanding of the text. As well, they can transform ideas from the text to create their own stories.

SUGGESTED CLASSROOM USAGE

This resource could be used as a read-aloud novel for grades three to five. Alternatively, it could be used as a guided novel study or for independent reading. Teachers might choose this novel as a part of a Book Club or Literature Circle activity. This novel could promote discussions and writing assignments that deal with friendship, family relationships, and pet ownership. Readers could benefit from discussion about the impact of poor self-regulation and parental permissiveness as one character faces the risk of failing fifth grade due to tardiness and lack of effort.

SOCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Gender Roles, Identity & Sexual Orientation

As Shame is about forced marriage in the South Asian community in Britain, gender roles are fairly rigid, with preference given to males over females.

Ethical and Legal

One of the characters (Murphy) jokes about continually arriving late for school and neglecting his homework. Even when it is revealed that he may fail fifth grade, he does not change his behaviour until the protagonist steps in and tries to enforce school expectations. Without teacher guidance, readers may perceive only the humour in Murphy's attitude and miss the serious impact.

Do the social considerations support, rather than detract from, student learning?

Near the end of the novel, Murphy's teacher and parent try to get him to take his school responsibilities more seriously, revealing that he may fail fifth grade because of his tardiness and neglect of his school work.

Although the main character in this novel is a boy, his struggle to convince his parents to buy him a dog is a universal cause for both boys and girls. As well, all children experience the uncertainties of friendships as they are growing up. Some readers may unreservedly enjoy the humour but other readers may find their enjoyment reduced by unrealistic elements such as a guinea pig keeping pace with a cyclist or doing tricks.

Rufus' friend Murphy remains loyal, despite attempts from a classmate who bullies Rufus in order to try to take Rufus' place as Murphy's best friend.
